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News From The Pews

Let's start with the good news! It's always good to be able to report a happy event, so it's wonderful to be able to announce the arrival of Rev Brendan and Claire's new baby, Raphael, who joined the Martin family at the Rectory on 23rd May. Congratulations to you all!

On 7th May, special services of celebration and commemoration for the Coronation were held in both churches, and were very well attended. For one couple, May 6th will be remembered as not only the day on which the King was crowned, but the day on which they got married! Harry Berry and Katherine Broad had set the date for their wedding, and arrangements were well under way some time before the date for the Coronation was announced. Although it rained on both the King and the happy couple, it was a memorable day, and a day about which Harry and Katherine will love to tell their grandchildren.

After those two life changing events, the more mundane news - In April a team of volunteers gave the church a much needed clear out and thorough spring clean. As part of our Eco Church land management plan for 2023, we followed the national initiative and took part in 'No mow May'. This meant that all moving and strimming in the church yard was suspended for a few weeks to allow time for early flowering wild flowers to set seed and encourage them to spread. Mowing continued in the small area from the Lychgate to the South door so that the front of the church looked neat for wedding photographs.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held early in May. At the meeting everyone was encouraged to read the review of the year and the supplementary reports to see what a busy year 2022 was for both churches, and to remind ourselves of what a very large number of volunteers are involved, in whatever capacity, in keeping our churches running and growing. The report showed that early in the year things were picking up well after Covid, the Tipi was up and running, the new office was up and running, then sadly the theft of lead from part of the roof in June dominated the rest of the year. Particular thanks were given to Rev Brendan for his leadership, for the example of faith and the good humour which he always shows although his patience is often sorely tried and tested!

We end our News from the Pews on a



very sad note, the death in May of Nick Jones left the village very shocked. Nick had health problems for several years, but hadn't allowed them to dominate his life and still managed to live a full life with his family. He was also a faithful servant to the church and the community, until the end. It's hard to imagine Frant without Nick, we will all miss him so much.

Frant Churchyard

Caring for our churchyard is a big undertaking and the Sussex Wildlife Trust and Kent High Weald Partnership are now advising us on the best way to care for it and a management plan is in place for its ongoing conservation. A plan of the churchyard giving a very brief description of the proposed work can be found in the church porch.

Following the great storm of 1987
Pat Wright took on the huge task of reclaiming the churchyard which, apart from a small area in front of the church, was totally overgrown with brambles.
The pathways had disappeared under leaves which had not been cleared for many years. Pat would clear a patch and then hand it over to a parishioner for its continuing care, and we now have the lovely churchyard you see today. Having headed up the team for the last 35 years

Pat is now stepping back, although you will often find her working there. So we give a very big thank you to Pat for her years of dedication and hard work, and trust that we will be able to carry on that work in the coming years.

There are just six people on the team caring for the churchyard and apart from one, all are over 70. We do need more help and would welcome new members to the team. Just two or three hours every other week would make a real difference - and it's a good exercise too! However, we appreciate it is not easy for many people to give their time so, if you have a loved one interred in the churchyard or just enjoy walking through it, would you consider making a contribution to the Churchyard Fund? This will enable us to employ a gardening firm to take on some of the mowing in early summer especially after "no mow May" - and clear leaves in the autumn.

All contributions will be very much appreciated and enable us to keep the churchyard from becoming overgrown again. They should be marked "Churchyard Fund" and be delivered to the church office (Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings) or posted in The Stables post box. Thank you.

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Eridge Church - "Regal Alter"

For the service to celebrate the coronation the altar in Holy Trinity Church was decorated with a suitably regal altar frontal (pictured right).

What makes the altar frontal particularly interesting is that it is made from some of the cloth which was hung to decorate Westminster Abbey for Queen Elizabeth' coronation in 1953. The frontal as donated by a retired clergyman, Revd Philip Stewart - Browning, and his wife who were members of the Eridge congregation in the 1950s. Unfortunately we do not know exactly how the Stewart-Brownings managed to get the material from the Abbey but the frontal has been used In Eridge when there are special services for royal occasions ever since.

Frant Parish Council

It will be interesting to see how the recent local election results change our District Council. The Conservatives have lost their majority after many years and we now have a Liberal Democrat/Green party alliance. The District Council has a big impact on our Parish in many ways but probably planning decisions are the most contentious. Jo Howell is still a District Councillor but after over 30 years has, understandably I think you will agree, decided to stand down from the Parish Council. She has been a loyal and positive member of the Parish Council over all these years and served our community, in that role with selfless distinction. We all owe her a great deal and our grateful thanks.

As I mentioned at our Annual Parish Meeting recently the newly elected Parish Council has some difficult decisions to make over the coming year. With only 5 elected Councillors (quality not quantity obviously!) and one coopted Councillor we will welcome any new members to help us with the tasks ahead. The main one is the proposed pedestrian crossing in Frant. This project begun several years ago but the projected costs are now ballooning to over £250,000 and that is before a shovel hits the earth.

The current time lines are that even, with all our ducks in a row, it will be at least 2-3 years before work commences and the increased costs by then will put it beyond our reach in financial terms. We need to come up with a Plan B as we



all agree that the Frant Road desperately needs some urgent traffic calming measures all the way from the Wadhurst Road Junction to the Abergavenny Arms and these might prove to be a better use of the funds we have available.

We also need to get the Albert Well renovated and we our currently looking into the costs involved. You won't be surprised to learn that as a conservation listed building these are in the region of £45,000!!! Sadly, in many ways, the days are long gone when the local 'oddjob' person could do these things for a fraction of the price.

Finally we will also be looking at Frant Green and how to prevent cricket balls in summer crossing the road and off-road SUVs in winter from crossing the green. All this and the day to day stuff should keep the Parish Council busy but fulfilled over the coming months.

News from Nus Ghani, MP

Aside from the royal celebrations, my diary over the past few weeks has been filled with lots of visits and meetings to support Wealden communities. Reports on just some of these are below.

Result! South East Water compensation payments secured for more Wealden households

Over 600 submissions have been made via the dedicated platform on my website to help asses the scale of South East Water's compensation chaos following the disruptive outage in the run up to last Christmas, which saw thousands of households across Wealden left without water for several days. Thank you to everyone who contributed. I shared

this evidence with South East Water to push for a comprehensive review of all impacted postcodes, and to ensure that the company directors were made aware of the personal impact of the disruption.

As a result, I secured payments to over 430 more households, which would have otherwise missed out on any compensation.


It is shocking and unacceptable that despite having no water in the run up to Christmas, these customers would have received no compensation without my involvement. I do hope that more good news will be forthcoming for other Wealden customers as I continue to campaign for a review of all impacted areas.

Visiting pupils at Framfield and Frant primary schools

It was an absolute pleasure to catch up with our young Wealden residents during my recent visits to Framfield and Frant primary schools for a Q&A session with Year 5 and 6 pupils about how laws are made in Westminster, and my duties and responsibilities as Member of Parliament and Minister of State.

On the day of my visit, the pupils at Frant school were learning about the Second World War and I enjoyed seeing their period costumes and pieces of equipment, as well as discussing the role of women in the war. It is always encouraging to see our young residents engaging in local issues and eager to make a positive contribution to their local area. I was impressed how courteous the students were while passionately expressing their views and there were some excellent suggestions for new laws which I will consider taking forward.

National Carers Week

Every June, I am proud to support National Carers Week to raise awareness of unpaid caring and recognise the invaluable contribution that carers across Wealden make to the livelihoods of unwell, older or disabled loved ones, and the vital role they play in ensuring that so many people across Wealden have better quality of life and personalised end of life care.

It is estimated that there are around 70,000 unpaid carers in East Sussex, with nearly 20,000 in Wealden. Without the right level of support, life as a carer can be extremely difficult. The wellbeing of carers is all too often forgotten, and Carers Week is an important campaign to raise awareness about the support available.

One of the local organisations providing support for unpaid carers across Wealden and East Sussex are Care for the Carers, who are an independent charity commissioned by East Sussex County Council and the NHS. They offer a free wraparound service including referrals to other local services, outreach support, one-to-one crisis help and guidance, coaching, training, wellbeing and support groups, activities and counselling. I also welcome The Carer's Leave Act,

which received Royal Assent recently and when in force next year will create a new statutory unpaid leave entitlement for employees who are caring for a dependant with a long-term care need. This will enable carers to better balance their caring and work responsibilities, supporting them to remain in employment.

I am hugely grateful for the amazing work Wealden carers do every day, and I continue working with our fantastic local charities, organisations and care homes to ensure that Wealden carers are better recognised and supported. Parish Past Bartley Mill (pictured above, c.1880), which lies just south of BYG off the Lamberhurst Road, has had an interesting history. From the 13th Century the area was in the ownership of Bayham Abbey, and it was during this time a pond was dug and timber waterwheel built so the monks could mill their corn: bread and a corn-based "pottage" were staples of the medieval diet. The Winn stream is not large

and the millpond seems to have been enlarged several times to store enough water to drive the wheel. In 1311 there was a major row when the miller there, Matthew Scott, refused to obey a notice to quit. The abbot then ordered his house to be pulled down around his ears, not too difficult perhaps when it $was\,most\,likely\,then\,constructed\,of$ timber and wattle, but not a particularly Christian act!

Bayham monastery was closed by order of Cardinal Wolsey in 1525, before the general closure by Henry VIII, and Bartley was bought first by John Lewkenor and then in 1536 by John Barham. The Barhams, who already owned land around Mayfield, claimed one of the murderers of Thomas a Becket as an ancestor but this John was known as "The Iern Man" owing to his success as an ironmaster. Under his ownership Bartley ceased to grind corn and became an ironworks, complete with a new iron waterwheel. One of several small ironworks along the valley to Riverhall Hill, Bartley remained in the ownership of the Barham family until 1723, when a later John died without children and his wife gave it and surrounding lands to her brother, Gabriel Egles of Uckfield, a much resented gift since it was recorded the "every stick and stone was signed away at the bidding

of a spiteful and domineering woman who ... had such advantage over her husband he would deny her nothing." By this time ironworking had ceased and Bartley returned to milling corn, to be eventually sold to the Bayham Estate in 1806. It continued to work until 1904, then became an engineering workshop in WW1. It reopened briefly to grind organic wholemeal in the 1980's. -Pat Wright

Siegfried Sassoon and Eridge

Siegfried Sassoon was a poet and writer who became famous for his First World War poems. He survived the war, and lived until 1967. He was born at Matfield near Tunbridge Wells in 1886. His father was from a wealthy Jewish family who had lived in India and the Middle East as successful traders, but Siegfried's father Alfred had no need to work. He married Theresa Thornycroft, from an engineering family. She painted and her brother Hamo became a famous sculptor. Alfred and Theresa bought Weirleigh, a Victorian house outside Matfield. Siegfried was the middle one of three boys, named by his mother after the hero of a Wagner opera, and was baptised and brought up a Christian. He had little interest in his father's family or their Jewishness. His parents became estranged, and his father died in 1895.

Siegfried and his brothers had a thoroughly English country upbringing, and Siegfried learned to ride, which is where Eridge comes in. He wrote three volumes of autobiography, which were partly fictionalised. He described himself as an orphan only child brought up by a spinster aunt, whose groom Dixon encouraged Siegfried to ride and got him involved in hunting. This was not entirely selfless - Dixon was very keen on hunting and the only way he could get involved was through his employer - though Siegfried describes Dixon as taking great care of him. In the biography the maiden aunt was far too nervous a rider to hunt, but in fact Siegfried's mother was a fearless rider. The local hunt (in the book) was the Dumborough, led by Lord Dumborough, which was actually the Eridge Hunt, led by the Marquess of Abergavenny. The Master of the Hunt was his younger brother Lord Henry Nevill. It had been started by the 5th Earl in 1878. The title of the book is Memoirs of a Fox-

Hunting Man, and Sassoon became deeply involved in hunting as a young man. Dixon often talked to him about Mr Macdoggart 'Lord Dumborough's hard-riding agent', who had won the Hunt Steeplechase one year. He described him as 'a gaunt, ginger-haired man in a weather-stained scarlet coat'. In real life, this was Mr Macbean, the land-agent, who presumably did look the way Sassoon described him. Sassoon's pseudonyms are sometimes obvious: Dixon (Dick's son) was actually Richardson, Moon, tutor to the Sassoon boys, became Star, but Dumborough and Macdoggart are less obvious, except that Macbean was Scottish.

Sassoon does not actually describe going to Eridge, as he keep everything a little vague in the Memoirs, and the hunt did not always start from there, but it seems very likely that he did. He bought a horse from a school friend who lived in Frant, Edgar Newgass. Siegfried became friendly with Norman Loder, a boy who hunted, and knew the Nevills, and later hunted with Norman's local hunt, the Southdown, further south in East Sussex, rather than the Eridge. The Memoirs therefore have little more to say about the Eridge Hunt. It is rather nice though to think about such a famous author riding around our area. Were Eridge and Frant in his thoughts during his awful experiences on the Western Front? The English countryside meant a great deal to him. -Mary Alexander

George Smart a tailor living in Frant, came to national fame in 2014 when Tate Britain had a Folk art exhibition and featured George Smart.

He was born in 1774 and died in 1846 and it is believed was buried in a pauper's grave outside the churchyard. Jonathan Christie explained how Smart used offcuts of his fabrics to produce his pictures. Many of them depicting 'Bright the postman' and the Goosewoman. Frant owned 3 Smarts but unfortunately, they were stolen from the memorial Hall in 2015, after the Tate Exhibition. Two have been returned and are, at the moment, undergoing repair. Some damage was done when they were taken out of their frames. We are very lucky to have these returned allowing the parishioners of Frant to enjoy them again in the future.

The Spring programme has been very successful and well attended with excellent speakers. We will begin again in September with a tea party at the George on the 8th. Our first afternoon meeting will be September 28th in the Stables at 2.30. The speaker will be Bertie Pearce and the topic Victorian Pleasure. Frant Memorial Hall Defibrillator Fundraiser Update

We are pleased to report that we now have two defibrillators available for use located within Frant village. As many of you may have noticed one is located on the car park side of the village hall on the outside wall whilst the second one is a portable one which is kept in The George. This is intended for use by the various groups that meet in the village, particularly the football club, cricket club etc.

The defibrillator at the village hall is kept in a locked heated cupboard. If the emergency services are required in the case of a cardiac arrest when 999 is called the operators will say where the nearest defibrillator is located and give the code to access the cabinet. The emergency services will then take over when they arrive and deal with the patient and the defibrillator. The defibrillator at the village hall is now registered on the national data base so will be available to anyone, if required, who dials 999.

Thank you once again to everyone who supported the various fundraising events which have made the purchases possible. Special mention should be made of Frant Film Club, The George, Balanced Accounting as well as various individuals who made generous donations. The Christmas Fair, a defibrillator trainer session which over 70 people attended and then enjoyed tea and cakes afterwards and a very



successful Quiz Night held in March all contributed to the fund. Thank you to everyone who has so generously supported these events.

We hope that the acquisition of two defibrillators for Frant village will make everyone more confident that if anyone suffers a sudden cardiac arrest, they will have early access to this potentially lifesaving equipment.


Frant School News

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

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
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
